Psychiatric Relevance for "Urethral Sounding" in Males - Not Just a Urologic Problem

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Urethral Sounding

insertion of a foreign body into urethra

Comparison of the Literature by Patient Age

Pediatrics

- More likely to undergo psychiatric evaluation
- Most inserted object: sewing needle
- Age range 11-12, possible connection with 1 internet access

Young Adult

- Stated motivated: sexual
- Most inserted object: some form of a wire/cable
- Substance use may also be a cause of behavior

Adult

- In patients with Schizophrenia, it appears this behavior exhibits most commonly in this age range
- Most inserted object: traditional urethral sounding instruments

Elderly

- Likely due to a cognitive impairment
- Most inserted object: common household items (pens, straws, etc)

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FORENSIC SERVICES

Future Research

- Further differentiating and exploring the motivation for sounding in psychiatric vs nonpsychiatric sounding
- Establishing guidelines on when to consult Psychiatry
- Educating Psychiatrists

 and other providers on
 how to teach safe

 sounding practices to
 patients

Commonly Associated Diagnoses

- Psychosis Schizophrenia, Delusional Disorder, and other etiologies
- Depression w/ or w/o suicidal ideation and/or attempts
- Non-Suicidal Self Injurious Behavior
- Substance Use Disorder
- Cognitive Impairment including Intellectual Disability, Dementia,
 Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI), and other etiologies
- Antisocial Personality Disorder
- Obsessive-Compulsive Disorder




Figure 1. CT pelvis showing pencil in urethra. https://doi.org/10.1155/2018/3018378
