

Traubert's Legacy




John W. Traubert, MD

Locally she serves as Medical Officer for the Mountaineer Area Rescue Group (MARG) and volunteers with the Quick Response Team (QRT) to help individuals struggling with addiction access treatment. Through WVU's Global Health Faculty, she teaches residents and medical students how to deliver quality primary care to underserved populations.





Faculty Spotlight: Crocetti Pilot Grant Funded

Dr. Emily Crocetti, who joined the University Town Centre faculty in 2024, has been awarded a prestigious \$55,000 grant from the American Board of Family Medicine Foundation to study the use of Point-of-Care Ultrasound (POCUS) in managing heart failure patients. Her research project, titled "Evaluating POCUS in Continuity-Focused Primary Care," will investigate whether measuring inferior vena cava (IVC) diameter using ultrasound in outpatient settings can help predict hospital readmissions and mortality in heart failure patients. This research is particularly significant given that WV had the highest rate of heart disease in the nation in 2021, and 50% of heart failure patients are readmitted to the hospital within six months. Dr. Crocetti's proposal was selected as 1 of only 13 funded projects from a highly competitive national pool of applications.

Dr. Crocetti developed her innovative idea into a pilot grant proposal with the support of the Family Medicine Research Division. Anaheim, CA. The AAFP represents approximately 130,000 family physicians across the country, and Dr. Hendershot will help shape policy to improve access to care, advance preventative medicine. and support family physicians across practice settings.
